Lorena Anton is Researcher in Social Anthropology at University of Bucharest. Her research examines abortion governance in Romania and France, history of European anthropology, and memory of communism and migration in Romania.

Her research interests encompass contraception, abortion and conscientious objection in Latin America and Europe.
